




One Cool Friend by Toni Buzzeo




Elliot, a very proper young man, feels a kinship with the penguins at the aquarium and wants to take one home with him.

A hard-bitten former search-and-rescue dog helps solve a complicated missing-chicken case.


Clever Jack Takes the Cake by Candace Fleming




A poor boy named Jack struggles to deliver a birthday present worthy of the princess.

Mister Bud, the family dog, has a satisfying routine to his life, but when another dog joins the family and disrupts his schedule, Mister Bud must learn to adapt.




Chicken Big by Keith Graves




A giant chicken hatches from an enormous egg, but the other chickens cannot accept that he is one of them.




Meet the Dogs of Bedlam Farm by Jon Katz



Contains photographs and the stories of Rose, Izzy, Frieda, and Lenore, four dogs that perform various jobs on Bedlam Farm.


I Want My Hat Back by Jon Klassen




A bear almost gives up his search for his missing hat until he remembers something important.

ride school buses.




The Gingerbread Man Loose in School by Laura Murray



A gingerbread man searches all over the school for the group of children that made him and then left him behind.


11 Experiments that Failed By Jenny Offill and Nancy Carpenter

Through a series of brief letters to his parents, Alex presents all the reasons why he should not have to share a room with his younger brother.




One by Kathryn Otoshi




Tales for Very Picky Eaters by Josh Schneider

A father tells outlandish stories while trying to get his young son, who is a very picky eater, to eat foods he thinks he will not like.




The One and Only Stuey Lewis by Jane Schoenberg

Swirl by Swirl: Spirals in Nature Joyce Sidman



An illustrated exploration of various examples of spirals appearing in nature, looking at snail shells, flower petals, elephant tusks, crashing waves, and more.


Balloons Over Broadway by Melissa Sweet
